HISTORY AND PURPOSE OF THE
AIR CORPS ADVANCED FLYING SCHOOL

Prior to July 1, 1922, advanced training in Observation was given at the Observation School at Post Field, while advanced training in the other three branches of the Air Corps was given at the tactical group of each branch. On this date the Air Corps Advanced Flying School was organized at Kelly Field, Texas, which took over, and has since been conducting all advanced training in the Air Corps. This School was organized as the 10th School Group, consisting of four school squadrons and one service squadron. The 40th School Squadron was designated as the bombardment unit of the school and was equipped with NBS1 planes after the spring of 1925. The 41st Squadron became the attack unit, and the 42nd Squadron the observation unit of the school. These two squadrons have been equipped with DH4B planes for both types of training. During the present class some O-2 planes were used for observation work for the first time. The 43rd Squadron is the pursuit unit of the school, and has been equipped with practically every type of pursuit plane since the war. Spads, SE5's, Fokker monoplanes, MB3A's, and even Sperry Messengers, have seen their day and been discarded. During the present class there has been present flights from the Pursuit Group, and also some planes permanently assigned to Kelly Field of the PW9 and P1A types. However, due to the shortage of pursuit type ships this Squadron has been keeping up the O-2's assigned to Kelly Field.

The purpose of the Air Corps Advanced Flying School is not only to perfect the pilot training of primary students, but primarily to train these students in the basic duties common to junior officers of the Air Corps, and the tactical employment and functioning of Attack, Bombardment, Pursuit and Observation Aviation.

For the purpose of carrying out its mission, the Advanced Flying School gives basic flying training on the service type planes, after which students are specialized in one of the branches of the Air Corps. Students are given actual field work corresponding as nearly to practical operations as the facilities at this station will permit. This class, which is the seventh to be graduated from the Advanced Flying School, did not go on the customary gunnery expedition to the Coast, but had as much aerial firing as could be given it, with the limited facilities available, on the Leon Springs Reservation.

MARCH 1927 CLASS HISTORY

Visualize a young man, who has just painted himself to his cronies as a hero entering into some extremely dangerous task, trying to convince his parents and sweethearts that flying is perfectly safe; put him on a train and send him to Brooks Field, and you have a Cadet. They are all much the same, having been selected by Air Corps men from thousands of applicants, and having similar ideals and aspirations. A group of about ninety such young men, assembled at Brooks in September, 1926, to form a class now graduating.

The first week was occupied by a small amount of general policing and infantry drill, a great deal of gawking (much to the amusement of the class which preceded us) at airplanes being stunted for no reason at all, numerous debates and discussions on the relative merits of home states, and an incredible amount of bunk fatigue. Sergeant Carey took us in hand and gave us our baptism of ground school with some choice remarks on the attractions of San Antonio, accompanied by a little instruction in How to Write an Army Letter and How the Army is Regulated. Basic military subjects, radio code and drill kept us busy the rest of September.

October 4th was the big day we all looked forward to; that was the day we started flying training. For many of us it was the first real airplane ride, for all of us it was the beginning of a new era—it might be said that that was the day our A. P. Wings sprouted. From then on our mornings were occupied with learning the rudiments of flying and keeping the ships serviced and clean, and our afternoons with an assortment of ground school courses, radio code and infantry drill. As we learned to make turns, climbing, level and gliding), take-off, and land, a desire to solo grew from a smouldering spark to an almost consummate passion. When our instructors finally got out of the ship and said, "Take it around and nothing but three point landings will do," although most of us won't admit it, the passion cooled; for we realized that he, who had always been present to correct our mistakes, would be on the ground and we hadn't better make any mistakes; but we took-off nevertheless and, to our profound surprise, our misgivings had been unfounded. It was at this period that the dreaded Faculty Board began to function and "washed out" those who were lacking in inherent flying ability, the "X" quantity of the Air Corps.

Eventually we all soloed, and then came the first phase work; starting with gentle eights at a thousand feet we were gradually allowed to do medium eights a little lower and were introduced to the tricky wingover. The Theory of Flight and Aircraft Instruments were occupying our ground school thoughts about this time, along with the ever present radio code and infantry drill. The Faculty Board apparently felt obliged to keep us aware of its presence and efficiency by eliminating more of the class for deficiencies in flying or ground school. Many met the board and a few, mighty few, were found worthy of retention.

When the task is interesting time seems to outdo itself in its flight; and our task being intensely interesting, the first phase work was completed and passed by the fortunate ones in seemingly short order. Second phase work in flying became the order of the day and we were initiated into the intricacies of 180's and 360's, steep eights at low altitude, and forced landings. Military Law was substituted for Infantry Drill, to the combined elation and consternation of the class, and Ground School and the everlasting radio code progressed as usual. The Board continued to hold its regular meetings and the unfortunates continued to be found deficient in their work.

Third phase followed second, strange as that may seem, and being taught aerobatics we began to feel more like real flyers; and the eternal barracks flying became involved with how to do rolls and half rolls. We began to take ourselves on surreptitious hedgehops and do a little cutting loose. Ground School was completed, and when weather permitted we flew both morning and afternoon, but radio code and infantry drill held out, along with the Faculty Board, almost to the end and managed to harass us considerably.

Formation, cross country, and night flying from headquarters stage has brought the primary training course at Brooks to a close. The Faculty Board has had its last shot at us and we are looking forward to Kelly Field and advanced training. We are thankful for excellent training ships, that no cadet has had a serious crack-up, and that we have the opportunity to watch the next class of flying cadets gaze in wonderment at barrel rolls and loops. We have just been graduated from the best primary flying school in the world and are rightfully proud of it.

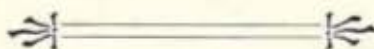
